Biography of Chairpersons and Facilitators



Mr. Sizwe Nxasana
Chairman: NECT

Sizwe Nxasana is a South African business executive, educator & chartered accountant.

He is the founder and CEO of Future Nation Schools and Sifiso Learning Group. He is the founding Chairman of the NECT as well as the chairman of the Ikusasa Student Financial Aid Programme (ISFAP) which funds and supports students pursuing occupations in critical skills from 'missing middle' backgrounds. Nxasana was the CEO of the FirstRand Banking Group for 10 years and before that the CEO of Telkom SA for 8 years. He is the director of the Solidarity Fund and chairs the Fundraising Committee. Sizwe is also a member of the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants.

He founded Sizwe & Co, KwaZulu-Natal's first black audit firm, in 1989, and in 1996 he became the founding partner of Nkonki Sizwe Ntsaluba, now Sizwe Ntsaluba Gobodo (SNG Grant Thornton). He is the co-founder and chairman of the National Education Collaboration Trust (NECT) as a response to the call by the National Development Plan (NDP) for increased collaboration among stakeholders to improve educational outcomes. He was the chairperson of NSFAS between 2015 and 2018.

Mr. Nxasana is one of the founding members of the Association for the Advancement of Black Accountants (ABASA) and served as the initial chairperson of its KwaZulu-Natal Branch as well as the organisation president from 1995 until 1998.

Nxasana was cited as one of the Top 100 most influential Africans by New African magazine in 2016.

He holds a BCom Accounting degree from the University of Fort Hare and a BCom Accounting Science honours degree from the University of South Africa (UNISA) and was one of the first 10 African CA's in South Africa. He also holds a postgraduate certificate in education from UNISA.

Sizwe Nxasana has been conferred with honorary doctorates by the Universities of Fort Hare, the Durban University of Technology, the University of Johannesburg, and the Walter Sisulu University. He is pursuing his PhD in Education at the Aalborg University in Denmark.







Dr Godwin Khosa

CEO: NECT

Godwin Khosa served as CEO of JET Education Services for nearly five years before his appointment as CEO of the National Education Collaboration Trust (NECT). While at JET Education Services he headed the NECT Secretariat pending the establishment of the Trust's full-time office.

A teacher by profession, Dr. Khosa worked as a policy analyst and senior manager at the Centre for Education Policy Development in the 1990s before joining the Human Sciences Research Council as a research manager and proceeding to JET Education Services. There he served initially as a team leader in an education transformation

programme in Limpopo and then as the organisation's Programme Director before being appointed CEO in 2009.

Dr Khosa was also a member of the Council of the University of Johannesburg, serving from 2012 to 2021. He holds a doctoral degree from the University of Sussex; a diploma and a master's degree in Public and Development Management from the University of Witwatersrand; a BA (Hons) in Geography from the University of South Africa, and a BA in Education from the University of the North.







Prof Brian Figaji
NECT:Trustee

Brian Figaji studied at the Universities of the Western Cape (UWC), Cape Town (UCT), University of South Africa (UNISA) and Harvard University in the USA.

He practiced as a professional engineer for 10 years in both contracting and design and then joined Peninsula Technikon which subsequent to the merger of 2004 became known as the Cape Peninsula University of Technology. Prof Figaji served the institution for 25 years with 10 of these years as Vice Chancellor (President). He left the institution in 2004 in opposition to the pending merger.

Among the many positions he held the most relevant positions were as:

A member and later Vice President of the Engineering Council of South Africa,

A member of the South African Council on Higher Education,

A representative of SA on the UNESCO Executive Board from 2005 to 2009,

Chair of the SA National Commission for UNESCO from 2009 to 2013 and

a member of the Council advising the President on National Orders (National Presidential Awards) until 2014.

He is also a:



In the context of civil society, he served on Education Trusts, a Performing Arts Board, a Board for Blood Transfusion services, National Board of the Scout Association, Environmental bodies like the Green Trust and the TMF, and on a body serving the needs of war blinded individuals. Until recently he was the chairperson of WESGRO, the Trade and Investment Agency for the Western Cape.

Currently he is also the non-executive Chair of one of the large fishing companies in the country and is involved in a few business ventures. He is married to Vera, and they have two children and four grandchildren.

Prof Rensburg is Non-Executive Director at the ABSA Group (one of Africa's largest banking groups), Chairperson of the South Africa National UNESCO Commission, Senior Advisor to the Principal, Visiting Professor and Life Fellow at King's College London, Senior Associate at Higher Education Leadership and Management (a programme of Universities South Africa, where he is project lead on the Executive Leadership Programme), and Honorary Professor at Nelson Mandela University.

Most recently he was Ombud (Interim) of the University of Cape Town, Chairperson of the Ministerial Committee on the Review of the South African Higher Education, Science and Technology Landscape, and Administrator of Vaal University of Technology (in which capacity he served as both council and Vice Chancellor of the university).

He was the founding Vice Chancellor of the University of Johannesburg (from 2006 to 2017), prior to which he was CE Strategic Services at the South African Broadcasting Corporation (from 2001 to 2006), Deputy Director General of South Africa's Department of Education from 1995 to 2001, where he spearheaded post-apartheid education policies and programmes.

Prof Rensburg was Commissioner of South Africa's National Planning Commission, where he chaired the working group on Social Protection and Human Capabilities. He served as Chairperson of the South Africa as well as the Southern Africa Universities Vice Chancellors Associations, Chairperson of the Ministerial Committee on Student Accommodation in South African Universities, Member of the Ministerial Committee on the Funding of South African Universities, Councilor of the Association of Commonwealth Universities, and Governor of the Commonwealth of Learning.

Prof Rensburg was General Secretary of South Africa's anti-apartheid movement, the National Education Crisis Committee, from 1986 to 1992, where he spearheaded local, regional and national teachers' and students' movements, and their anti-apartheid protest and post-apartheid policy initiatives.





Prof Rensburg holds the Doctor of Philosophy degree in International Comparative Education at Stanford University, USA., an MA degree in Political and Organisational Sociology, also from Stanford University, USA, and the B. Pharmacy degree from Rhodes University. In 2004 he completed the Global Executive Development Programme at the Graduate Institute of Business Science (GIBS, University of Pretoria).

His recent publications are: SADTU and the Origins of Professional Unionism, 1976-1995, In, SADTU and the Struggle for Professional Unionism, (editors Michael Cross, Logan Govender and Ahmed Essop, UKZN Press, 2023); Serving Higher Purposes: University Mergers in Post-Apartheid South Africa (2020, African Sun Media); and, Transforming Universities in South Africa: Pathways to Higher Education Reform (editor, with Shireen Motala and Michael Cross) (2020, Brill/Sense).







Prof. Leketi Makalela
University of
Witwatersrand

Leketi Makalela is a full professor, founding Director of the Hub for Multilingual Education and Literacies and Deputy Head of the Wits School of Education at the University of the Witwatersrand. He is a Distinguished Visiting Professor at City University of New York. His research areas include translanguaging, multilingual education and literacies. He is a B-rated researcher and a holder of the National Research Foundation SARCHi Chair on Advancing African Languages for Social Inclusion and Access. He pioneered a globally acclaimed theoretical model: "ubuntu translanguaging" and its pedagogical equivalent, "ubuntu translanguaging pedagogy" to normalize simultaneous learning and teaching in more than one language in complex multilingual education systems. One of his highly influential publications is "Shifting Ienses: multilanguaging, decolonization and education in the global South." His latest books are: 'Decolonising multilingualism in Africa: Recentering Silent Voices from the Global South' (with Finex Ndlovu); 'Rethinking Language Use in Digital Africa: Technology and Communication in Sub-Saharan Africa.' (with Goodith White); 'Not Eleven Languages: Translanguaging and South African Multilingualism in Concert'; and 'Language and institutional identity in the post-apartheid South African higher education: perspectives on policy and practice'. His academic citizenship includes being past Executive Committee of Umalusi Council and current Technical Advisor to the Department of Basic Education's National Language Unit.







Mr Duncan Hindle

Mr Hindle has taught at primary and secondary school levels, and lectured at Edgewood College of Education (Education Technology) and the University of Natal (Sociology of Education).

In 1995 Duncan Hindle was elected President of SADTU, and in 1996 he joined the newly formed Department, in the position of Chief Director: Human Resources. Following a period as Deputy Director General (Curriculum), he was appointed Director General in 2005.

In 2010, after overseeing the division of the Department into two new Ministries, Mr Hindle served as Special Adviser to the Minister of Agriculture, and as Chief of Staff in the Ministry of Energy.

Mr Hindle currently runs the DialogueSA Programme of the NECT. He is appointed to the Council for Quality Assurance in General and Further Education (Umalusi), and chairs the accounting Authority of the ETDP SETA. He has recently been appointed as chair of the HRDC Summit Content Committee, preparing for the 2024 Summit.







Dr Naledi Mbude Head Language Policy Unit

Naledi Mbude is a Science teacher, having studied both at the University of Cape Town and at Rhodes University. Her interest in socio-linguistics was ignited at UCT while studying towards her Bachelor of Education majoring in Science Education coached by Professor Rochford (MHSRIP).

She discovered Multilingual Education through Professor Neville Alexander (MHSRIP) who later nurtured and appointed her at the Project for Alternative Education in South Africa (PRAESA) at UCT as a Multilingual Science Education Coordinator (1999 – 2004). She worked with diverse specialists in Language in Education viz. Professor Sizwe Satyo, Dr S Gxilishe, Dr M Jadezweni; Professor K Heugh and many others who were colleagues at UCT and some at other HEIs, they had a positive contribution to her passion. Naledi has made numerous presentations on the subject of Multilingual Education in seminars and conferences locally; in other African countries and internationally throughout her career as a Multilingual Education Specialist. Professor R. Kaschula journeyed with Naledi while juggling her work as a Senior Member of the civil service in the DoE, who was pursuing both her Master's and PhD at Rhodes University. Professor Kaschula provided a much needed anchor as a supervisor at a very difficult time. This phase in her journey highlighted why Languagein-Education Policies in Africa rarely get fully implemented for the benefit of the majority of African language learners. Their schooling experiences are characterized by an exclusion of their home languages as Languages of Teaching, Learning and Assessment (LoLTA). It highlighted that it is not sufficient for language activists to ensure that African governments have apt Language-In- Education Policies; implementation lives or dies at the hands of teachers/ officials. Their opinions, attitudes, skills and willingness matters. Invest in bringing them along. Dr Mbude pioneered Mother Tongue-based Bilingual Education (MTBBE) in the Eastern Cape (EC) from 2010. She established the Only Language Unit in the country to implement Multilingual Education. The unit addresses issues of racism, linguicism and language policy mismatches in schools. These efforts led to the first Grade 12 Bilingual Trial examinations in 2020 for the EC, a ground-breaking first for the country. Dr Mbude – Mehana is a proponent of the rights of children to epistemological access to the Curriculum.







Prof. Yusuf Sayed
Cambridge
University

Yusuf Sayed is the Professor of Education: Equity and Social Justice at the University of Cambridge. He was previously the Professor of International Education and Development Policy at the University of Sussex, the South African Research Chair in Teacher Education, and the Founding Director of the Centre for International Teacher Education (CITE), at the Cape Peninsula University of Technology (CPUT), South Africa. Yusuf was also the Senior Policy Analyst at the EFA Global Monitoring Report, UNESCO, Team Leader for Education and Skills, the Department for International Development UK, and Head of the Department of Comparative Education at the University of the Western Cape, South Africa.

Yusuf is an international education and development policy specialist. His research focuses on understanding the nexus between the development and implementation of policy at different levels of the education system and its implications for the achievement of national and global education policy goals focused on equity, inclusion and empowerment. His work examines the development and implementation of education policies for achieving the right to, in and through education based on an ethic of substantive, inclusive social justice. To date, he has published more than 10 books/monographs, over 130 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters, and over 50 research reports on key education policy focusing in particular on teachers and teacher education; education exclusion and inclusion; the governance of education. He has recently completed several large scale comparative education and development projects: an ESRC/DFID (now FCDO)-funded project "Engaging teachers in peacebuilding in post-conflict contexts: evaluating education interventions in Rwanda and South Africa; an European Commission (EC) funded study 'Safe and quality education for girls and boys in displacement situations in Ethiopia and Somalia'; a project on Global Teacher Education Policies and Practices for Equitable and Quality Education together with partners in India including AUD, JMI, NIEPA and TISS ,and National instate of Humanities and Social Sciences (NIHSS) BRICs funded grant focusing on India and South African examining Crisis, Education Policy and Equity in both contexts.

He is currently engaged in several large-scale studies about teacher professionalism, and teacher professional development in South Africa and globally. He is current leading the first large scale national study of Teacher Pedagogy and Practice in South Africa.







Mrs Sesi, Nombulelo Nxesi is the Chief Executive Officer of the Education, Training and Development Practices Sector Education and Training Authority (ETDP SETA) and has been at the helm since 2004. Prior to her appointment as the CEO, she was with the Department of Education, National Office, where she was appointed as Director for Teacher Development from 1999-2004. Mrs Nxesi was the Chief Education Specialist for Curriculum and Teacher Development (1998-1999) and Deputy Chief Education Specialist, Teacher Supply, Utilisation and Development (1997-1998), both these specialist posts were based at the Gauteng Department of Education. She Lectured in Mathematics and Physical Science at the Daveyton College of Education from 1995-1997.

Mrs Nxesi's career commenced in the teaching space in 1989 where she was a Teacher and Head of Department: Mathematics and Sciences.

Mrs Nxesi serves as a Member of the Advisory Committee of the Public Service Training Forum (PSTF) which is chaired by the Minister of the Department of Public Service and Administration.

She is currently a Council and Executive Member of the Human Resources Development Council (HRDC). She also serves as the President of the Southern African Society for Cooperative Education and Work Integrated Learning (WIL).

Mrs Nxesi served a

s the chairperson of the SETA CEOs Forum until September 2018, she was re-elected as the Deputy Chairperson of the SETA CEOs Forum.

She also served as a Council member of Higher Education (CHE) until November 2019.

Mrs Nxesi served as a Council Member, Senate Member and Human Resource Committee (HRC) at the Central University of Technology (CUT).
